

Mulherin Named 2017 Hartman Award Winner

ATHENS – Dr. William B. “Butch” Mulherin, who served as one of the Georgia football program’s team doctors — and its first orthopedic surgeon — for 33 years, has been named the 2017 Bill Hartman Award recipient, one of the highest honors given to a former UGA student-athlete.

Mulherin will be recognized at the Bulldogs’ game this Saturday against Samford.

Mulherin, a native of Augusta, graduated from Richmond Academy and first attended UGA in 1952. He lettered as both an offensive and defensive end for the Bulldogs from 1953-55. Upon graduation, he returned to Augusta and continued his studies at the Medical College of Georgia. Coming from a family of doctors, Mulherin earned his degree from MCG in 1961, with a specialty in orthopedics. He then spent one year in a general surgical residency in Augusta before moving to Atlanta to serve as the first full-time surgical resident at the Georgia Baptist Hospital.



Mulherin later served a surgical residency at the Scottish Rite Hospital in Atlanta. It was there he met Dr. Fred Allman, a fellow UGA alumnus and a pioneer in the field of sports medicine. Allman convinced Mulherin that their alma mater needed full-time attention from an orthopedist.

Mulherin moved to Athens in 1966, founded the Athens Orthopedic Clinic and joined the Bulldogs’ medical staff on a regular basis. He became one of the first orthopedic surgeons to provide daily care to an SEC team, traveling to every road game and attending practices regularly. He joined Dr. Jack Hughston (Auburn) as early trailblazers in this regard.

Not only did Mulherin remain with the Bulldogs until 1999, he helped grow the Athens Orthopedic Clinic into one of the region’s largest and best of its kind. He started the clinic with two exam rooms and a single nurse on staff. Today it occupies a space of over 16,000 square feet with a staff of over 20 doctors and nearly four times more support personnel.

Named for the late Bill Hartman, Georgia’s long-time kicking coach and chairman of the Georgia Student Educational Fund, the Hartman Award is one of the greatest honors given to a former UGA student-athlete. The Hartman Award has been presented annually since 1992 and recognizes former Georgia student-athletes who have demonstrated excellence in their profession and/or in service to others by 20 or more years of superior performance after graduation. Only former varsity athletes who have received a baccalaureate degree from Georgia can be considered for the award.

From Georgia to the Hall of Fame, Terrell Davis proved he was a difference-maker

While it wasn't exactly a weighty cultural shock for Terrell Davis when he left a disbanded football program at Long Beach State for the University of Georgia in 1992, it was nonetheless different.

He temporarily vacated the surf, Pacific breezes, lively lifestyle of Southern California and a variety of ethnic cooking and seafood options for the Deep South environment which was unlike anything he experienced, from the humidity to cuisine – more often than not, at mealtime, barbecue and vegetable plates, although by the time he showed up in the Classic City, it had become, with liquor by the drink sales, a place with trendy restaurants beginning to proliferate.

The Oconee River didn't provide much to cool down things as the Pacific does at his collegiate address and hometown (he grew up in San Diego), but there was something special about Athens and the University of Georgia. He sensed that from the beginning.

"They took football seriously," he says, which meant offseason workouts got the highest priority. That was his introduction to the way things were done with the Bulldogs and in the Southeastern Conference. The laid-back living he had experienced in Southern California was not compatible with the ways and means of Georgia football.

One January morning after he had transferred, he was sleeping in when a resounding knock on the door awakened him. He opened the door to greet Joe Tereshinski, who informed him offseason workouts were mandatory. Terrell thought they were optional.

Terrell soon realized at Georgia, he could flourish as a running back. and knew the Tailback U moniker that had

taken place with Herschel Walker and other running backs, including teammate Garrison Hearst, was something he could appreciate. He was ready to go to work.

Looking back, Terrell's hindsight confirms his timing along the way has been extraordinary. He developed as a running back in Athens, where he saw the toughest of college defenses in the rugged Southeastern Conference. Then when he got to Denver, Mike Shanahan had just been hired and was putting the pieces together for a Super Bowl run. Denver had John Elway, a seasoned and creative quarterback hungry for a championship. An explosive running back with punch and deft running ability would certainly make a difference. Terrell Davis was the Broncos' man.

Shanahan, who had coached at Florida, knew about the eminence of SEC running backs and immediately took a liking to Davis, who would become a central offensive component in the Elway backfield.

Before you could exclaim "mile high," the Elway-Davis combination would bring Denver two Super Bowl titles – XXXII and XXXIII. Terrell was the MVP of Super Bowl XXXII. His legend would grow. He would become a member of one of the most exclusive clubs in American sport – The National Football League Hall of Fame.

Naturally, he was overwhelmed when the news was delivered. When the dust settled and he had reflected on his high honor, he realized he was in the same club with running backs like Jim Brown, Walter Payton, Jimmy Taylor and other classic runners. "I'm still not believing it," he said.

As the tributes, high fives and congratulatory verbiage flooded in, he took time to offer thanks to the many who came his way, beginning with his mother Kateree Davis, who raised eight children. Then there was a legion of coaches and teammates whose faces and images flashed through his consciousness.

For every touchdown (his nickname became T.D. which reflected his initials and the abbreviation for touchdown – something he generated in abundance throughout his career), there was encouragement and teaching to make him be the best he could be. With teammates, every score was accompanied by a block, some consequential.

"Any running back who understands the meaning of team," Terrell says, "knows you can only excel when there are offensive linemen who make a difference. I learned a lot

about that at Georgia and then with Denver, which brought about a lot of honor and recognition. I will always be grateful to my coaches and teammates.”

At Georgia, he saw what emphasis with the running game did for Garrison Hearst. He knew he was gaining an advantage from playing in the SEC. Then there was Greg Davis, the Bulldogs play caller and offensive backfield coach. “Coach Davis put in some wrinkles that made a difference in our offense,” Terrell remembers.

One of those wrinkles was utilizing Terrell on passes out of the backfield. “We used a lot of four-wides quite a bit,” Greg Davis recalls. “Then we took advantage of his exceptional ability with catching balls out of the backfield. Against Auburn in ’94, Terrell just had one of those terrific running back days (25 carries for 113 yards). I remember him being highly productive although the game wound up in a 23-23 tie.”

When the NFL draft was coming up the following spring, Greg Davis got a call from Gary Kubiak, who was the offensive coordinator whom Greg had coached at Texas A&M. Kubiak’s message included a question about time missed his senior year. Kubiak wanted to make sure there were no underlying or hidden issues.

Greg Davis was quick to point out Terrell had one of the toughest injuries there is to get over – a hamstring. “I knew that when he was well,” Greg says, “that he was one of the best backs in the league. I told Gary that and more.” The “more” was this scouting report for the Broncos, from, perhaps the man who knew Terrell the best: “He has excellent hands and is one of the most intelligent runners I have ever seen. The

defense, the way it lines up, can often tip what it wants to do. A smart running back like Terrell will pick up on that. Terrell also had that rare ability to run under control. A lot of backs can’t run under control from the start of the play to the line of scrimmage with so many things happening in front of them.

“Terrell was a master at running under control. He had remarkable vision, which only the truly great running backs have. He was very patient. He could not have gone to a better place than Denver with Alex Gibbs being the line coach and using those zone blocking schemes.”

Kubiak became excited when he saw how Terrell ran the ball those few times in the Blue-Gray game. “Mike (Shanahan) and I thought he was a special player. We were just starting out in Denver and didn’t have a lot of options in the draft. I recall our first draft pick came in the fourth round and we couldn’t take Terrell until the 6th round. We were so overjoyed when he was still there. That is one of our best picks ever.”


The Broncos knew John Elway needed help and immediately saw Terrell was what the Bronco offense needed. “When you have one of the best quarterbacks in the league and you draft a runner like Terrell, then you have something special. Terrell Davis, and his record proves it, was one of the greatest difference makers we ever had at Denver. He took a lot of pressure off John and we began to have one of the best offenses in the league. You couldn’t have a greater combination of players in a backfield than John Elway and Terrell Davis.



*Congratulations to **Champ Bailey** (1996-98) on his induction into the Georgia Sports Hall of Fame. The induction will be held at the Macon City Auditorium on February 24, 2018. The below article is from the Georgia Sports Hall of Fame.*

Bailey, one of the most versatile players in Georgia history, starred for the Bulldogs from 1996-98. He was a consensus All-American in 1998 as he logged snaps at cornerback and receiver and on returns. Bailey won the Bronko Nagurski Award as the nation's top defender in 1998. He also was a member of the track and field team and set a school indoor long jump record at the 1998 SEC Championship. Bailey continued his success in the NFL as a 12-time Pro Bowl performer for the Washington Redskins and the Denver Broncos. He was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 2000s.

Erk

This is the time of the year when college football teams are maneuvering to seize opportunity, to attain the ultimate glory that now comes to only one team. The playoffs have brought that about, much to the pleasure of most fans and officials.

It is easy to embrace compatibility with college football today, the game action drama, tailgating, band and fresh faced cheerleaders—just like it has always been, but the one feature of the game that stimulates concern in some corners is that offensive firepower is threatening to render defense obsolete.

Seeing games like 48-47, even 35-33, makes one wonder if Erskine Russell, the exalted assistant at Georgia and hero for the ages at Georgia Southern, winning three national championships, would recognize the game we have begun to play.

There are stories with offensive linemen trumpeting the high paced, high scoring game which tires out the defense. “It is fun,” they say, “to keep the defense on its heels.” With certainly, Erk would take issue with that notion.

To remember Erk Russell, as his legion of players and close friends do, you have to remember the man, who happened to coach football for a living. He was a person of goodwill and humor, forever walking on the light side. He would have been a successful leader in any profession. It would be hard to believe there has ever been a coach who related better with his players. One who was more beloved? One who gave more of himself?

Erk was keen on slogans, chief among them the essence of team building: “BIG TEAM, little me.” He had tee shirts printed with that verbiage, and the players wore them proudly.

He took that slogan to Georgia Southern and you still hear it bandied about in Athens. His grandson, “Rooster,” the head coach at Bremen, uses the phrase to help motivate his teams today.

Erk enjoyed his time in Athens, but he wanted to become a head coach; He had a burning ambition to run his own program. A man’s man, Erk was a devout beer aficionado. He referred to his favorite drink as, “the nectar of the gods.” We were enjoying a beer one afternoon at the Rockwood Inn, a watering hole near the campus, in early 1981 after Georgia’s national championship season when he looked up from a sip of his favorite brew and said, “You know, I could go find a good high school job and be happy.” That brought about an emotional jolt, but I came to appreciate what he was saying. Coaching is coaching no matter the level. No coach ever enjoyed pure coaching more than Erk who found a way to get the most out of every kid on the team. In his high school annual, he wrote that his ambition was to “succeed Mr.

DeYampert.” J. W. DeYampert was his high school coach. Consider what he accomplished at Georgia Southern. Always spicing all conversations with a resonating quip, Erk said that when he was recruited to Statesboro, “I took the athletic director to dinner and he stayed at my house,” reflecting how bare the cupboard was with the Eagles. When Erk showed up for the press conference to announce his hiring, Georgia Southern had to go out and buy a football for a prop.

He immediately set about with that wide smile of his, selling the Eagle program. Erk got hand-me-down and left over equipment (much of it from Howard Beavers, the equipment manager at Georgia) from a variety of sources. The community in Statesboro pitched in. Somebody gave him a lawnmower, another some lumber for upgrading the locker room and many would walk up to him at Snooky’s Restaurant where he hung out and give him cash.

Talk about lifting a program up by its boot straps! Erk literally made something out of nothing. In the end, however, his memory is clouded by a circumstance which fires the ire of his countless players and loyal friends.

With all his championship success in the short time he was a head coach, he only won 83 games. To be elected to the College Football Hall of Fame you must win 100 games. That it is a hard and fast policy. “All his players are upset about that,” says Frank Ros, captain of the 1980 Georgia national championship team.

My take is that Erk will always be beloved and that he rests in peace knowing he remains No. 1 in the hearts of all who knew him.

Mr. DeYampert, by the way, would be pleased.
