


FEATURED LETTERMAN

WILLIE MCCLENDON

(1976-77-78)

I am the oldest of 7 kids (6 boys and 1 girl) born to Willie and Nancy McClendon of Brunswick, GA and attended Glynn Academy High School from 1972 -1975 playing football, basketball and running track. I started listening to UGA football via radio (Larry Munson) in 1973 and watching Coach Dooley's (UGA) and Coach Ray Graves (UF) television shows on Sundays. Track and field was my entry into football recruiting. I had success running the 100-yard dash (9.7) and 200-yard dash (21.4) my junior year in high school. The summer of 1974 UGA, Florida State, South Carolina, Georgia Tech, and University of Kansas started recruiting me to play football and UGA and GT were an easy narrowing of the recruiting list. I wanted to attend GT for all the reasons an 18-year-old kid wanted to (Atlanta). My parents and especially Mom were not hearing it at all. Coach Dooley stressed living in McWhorter Hall with a 11pm curfew, dining hall, laundry room, and study hall. In other words, Coach recruited Mom, and Me being the biggest Mommy Boy in the world, I reported to UGA in August 1975- fifty years ago.

My UGA family grew very quickly with the 1975 football freshmen class, coaches, trainers, managers, and support staff and the many varsity football players for the 1975 season.



Those relationships established 50 years ago are still Bulldog Strong today.

I met my wife, Susan Crim, at UGA and she and I were married for 38 years and we have 3 great kids: Brandon, Bryan, and Brent. Susan passed in 2019 and now I have my own personal Angel blessing and caring for our family. Brandon is a school teacher in the Atlanta Public System, Bryan coaches pro football as the wide receiver coach for the Tampa Bay Bucs, and Brent works for my company, WM Ventures Inc. WM Ventures Inc. specializes in underground and overhead utility construction.

My UGA experience has been nothing but a blessing. My brother, Tyrone, played for Coach Dooley's 1986 and 1987 team. I coached under Ray Goff from 1990-1995. My son, Bryan, played under Coach Mark Richt from 2002-2006 and began his coaching career at UGA, and my nephew, Warren, played for Coach Smart from 2020-2022. I am now B Mac's dad and a granddad 7 times. I am the self-proclaimed very best granddad in the world. My grandson, Bryan, attends Reinhardt University playing football and I truly enjoy watching my grandkids grow up competing in sports.

Florida-Georgia Hall Of Fame To Induct Gilbert, Michel

Jacksonville, Fla. – The Florida-Georgia Hall of Fame will celebrate four standout players with their induction into the Hall of Fame on Friday, October 31, 2025. The prestigious Induction Ceremony and Luncheon, presented by Miller Electric Company, will take place at 12:30 pm at Hyatt Regency Jacksonville Riverfront, a new location for this event, as part of the Georgia-Florida Weekend.


This year’s inductees include Georgia Bulldog stars Freddie Gilbert and Sony Michel, alongside Florida Gator greats Brandon James and Todd Johnson. These four players will be recognized for their exceptional contributions to the storied rivalry between the two programs.

University of Georgia

Freddie Gilbert – Georgia Bulldog 1980-1983

Freddie Gilbert was a dominant defensive force for Georgia during one of the most successful eras in program history. A native of Griffin, Ga., Gilbert went 4–0 against Florida during his career, anchoring the defense in memorable wins such as the 44–0 shutout in 1982 and the narrow 10–9 victory in 1983. Known for stepping up in big games, he tallied eight tackles with three for loss against Florida in 1981, prompting head coach Vince Dooley to call his performance “outstanding.” Over four seasons, Gilbert recorded 233 tackles, 26 sacks (sixth all-time at Georgia), and set the school’s single-game sack record with five against Temple in 1983. A two-time All-SEC selection and 1983 All-American, Gilbert helped Georgia capture the 1980 national championship and three straight SEC titles.

Following college, Gilbert went on to play professionally in both the USFL and NFL. He began with the New Jersey Generals, teaming up with fellow Bulldog legend Herschel Walker before joining the Denver Broncos. Gilbert played four NFL seasons, highlighted by appearances in Super Bowl XXI and XXII with the Broncos. His blend of power, consistency, and championship pedigree made him one of Georgia’s most impactful defensive linemen of the early 1980s.



Sony Michel – Georgia Bulldog 2014-2017

Sony Michel cemented his legacy in Georgia football history with explosive performances in rivalry games and on the national stage. A South Florida native, Michel closed out his Georgia-Florida series career in style, rushing for 137 yards and two long touchdowns in the Bulldogs’ 42–7 victory in 2017. Over four seasons, he compiled 3,638 rushing yards, 33 touchdowns, and more than 600 receiving yards, becoming one of just a few Bulldogs to record multiple 1,000-yard seasons. Ranked No. 3 on Georgia’s all-time rushing list, he served as a two-time permanent captain and was instrumental in leading the Bulldogs to the 2017 SEC Championship and their first College Football Playoff appearance.

Michel’s senior season proved historic, highlighted by his 181-yard, three-touchdown performance in the Rose Bowl to send Georgia to the National Championship Game. His college success carried into the NFL, where he was drafted in the first round by the New England Patriots in 2018. Michel won two Super Bowls in five seasons—scoring the only touchdown in the Patriots’ Super Bowl LIII victory and later capturing another title with the Los Angeles Rams in 2022. He retired with 3,243 career rushing yards and 18 touchdowns in the NFL.

Horace King

There is redeeming serendipity when you interact with a former player who had his day in the sun, overcoming stiff challenge but maturing into senior citizen status with humility and thanksgiving.

Horace King today is enjoying retirement, which includes the benefits of nine years in the National Football League's retirement program, his marketing and sales career with General Motors, and social security. Life is good.

There is a deep and abiding appreciation for the University of Georgia, an institution which would have rejected him for unfortunate but obvious reasons if he had been five years older. He doesn't dwell on that but focuses on the positive, expressing gratitude and respect "for a great institution."

He was one of the five African Americans who became the first black football players on scholarship at UGA. He went from Coca-Cola sales—which allowed him to get into the games for free, provided he sold all his Cokes—to scoring four touchdowns against Ole Miss in 1974, which tied the school record for TDs scored in a game.

Three years earlier, he "lost money," when he paid for his rack of Cokes and made no effort to sell them. Georgia was hosting Houston in a hyped-up game, owing to the fact that the Cougars had several black players on its team—big-name stars like Paul Gipson, running back, and Elmo Wright, wide receiver and the player who performed the first end zone dance.

It never crossed his mind that in those segregation days, he would show up between the hedges wearing a red jersey and listening to the supportive yells of 60,000, which is why he forgives and forgets.


Growing up on the west side of Athens, Horace learned the basics of "doing right" from his parents, Harry and Minnie. His father was a rigid advocate of a no-nonsense protocol. "He did not spare the rod," Horace laughs as he reflects on his growing up years.

Strict discipline was required in the King household. Horace had chores and was expected to fulfill his responsibility. We be unto him if he sloughed off any requirement. While his dad meted out discipline for bad behavior, his mom was in his ear about making good grades. One thing was written in stone.

Don't disappoint her because that might cause her to bring his daddy into the discussion.

The King property at 462 Henderson Extension allowed for a productive vegetable garden. Horace's father grew vegetables, not only for the family, but also to sell to families in the neighborhood. This honorable enterprise taught Horace the value of managing his money and looking for opportunities to supplement his income.

It did not take long for him to find an outlet for his teenage energy—high school football. He had natural skills that complemented his ability to run with the ball. It didn't take long for him to start at halfback for Clarke Central, the newly created high school following integration. He was a dog that could hunt.



As he was maturing as a halfback for the Gladiators, integration of the public-school systems was taking place, too. Across town, Vince Dooley had made the decision to go all out in recruiting black football players. The first five scholarship Bulldogs were King, Clarence Pope, Richard Appleby, Larry West, and Chuck Kinnebrew. Their photos are prominently displayed in the Butts-Mehre Building.

Horace has gone all out to support the UGA Football Lettermen's Club. For home games, he arrives early to help with the cooking at the parking lot near the Oconee Hill cemetery. "The Lettermen's Club is a brotherhood," Horace says, "and it has been great for me to meet and learn about the guys who played before and after me."

Younger players are sometimes overwhelmed when they are exposed to Horace's resume. Following his career at Georgia—he was chosen in the sixth round of the 1975 NFL draft by the Detroit Lions—Horace played nine years in the league and was the team's leading rusher in 1977. His best season came in 1978 when he started 15 games and totaled 1,056 yards—660 rushing and 396 receiving.

Today, Horace plays as much golf as possible and supports many charitable causes, forever grateful for his UGA experience. "When I signed with Georgia, I heard the same thing from Coach Vince Dooley that I heard from my parents. Give as great of an effort in the classroom as you do on the football field. I am so proud of my Georgia degree. It is one of the most important things in my life," he says.

Robert Miles

The University of Georgia chapter of the National Football Foundation recently conducted its annual awards banquet which was the conclusion of the tenure of Robert Miles as president.

Georgia has the largest chapter in the nation, and Miles has been an influential leader of an organization which has, for many years, underscored charitable

support for the community along with honoring outstanding football players and local citizens.

Robert grew up in Montgomery, the sixth of seven children, the “knee” baby a term that reflects that the baby of the family was always in the matriarch’s lap and the next oldest was always at her knee.

While he knew austerity in his life, Robert was the beneficiary of family togetherness and was imbued with the influence of the value of education. He was a responsible student, never disdain homework and was always uplifted by learning opportunities.

He grew up in segregated Montgomery, constantly troubled emotionally that the state capital was labeled “Cradle of the Confederacy.” Alabama car tags also featured that slogan. However, Robert constantly underscored positive principles, always too busy to hate.

There were two influences which were defining in his life: St. Jude, the parochial school he attended where he learned to appreciate discipline and classroom responsibility and his grandfather’s farm which was 25 miles out in the country.

His grandparents also owned a grocery store in the community of Hayneville. While there were farm chores he was expected to assist with, there was the treat that came from enjoying vegetable-oriented meals. “My grandparents always had a vegetable garden with things like corn, peas, cantaloupe, and watermelon. It was fun helping them cultivate and harvest in season. We enjoyed working in the garden because we knew how great mealtime would be,” Robert says.

At St. Jude, Robert learned about discipline and played sports. He grew to be 6’4” and 225 pounds. There was speed and

quickness in his makeup, and he was motivated to compete and improve.

He played on the St. Jude basketball team which won the state AA title which was his first taste of winning a championship which would be surpassed by Georgia’s winning the 1980 national championship in football.

That was a high moment in his football life. Not just the ring, but the companionship and love that existed among the team members, a diverse group that today remains irretrievably bonded—an ongoing mutual admiration society. “We meet from time to time and are always keeping in touch with each other. If someone needs an assist, we all work to see if we can provide what ever is needed,” Robert says.

Growing up in a state which has one of the biggest football rivalries in college football, Auburn and Alabama, he was attracted to the Auburn program during the heyday of Pat Sullivan and Terry Beasley. In Alabama, you can’t be neutral. You must declare allegiance to one or the other.

When it came time for him to make college plans, he aspired to complete on the college level and had an open mind about where he would enroll. He knew that he would likely have to walk on wherever he played. There were not a lot of college scouts hanging around his high school.

At that time, a high school coach in Atlanta, Calvin Jones, had taken a job with the Bulldog basketball program but he was also a football recruiter. He had married into Robert’s family and told him, “You should take a look at the University of Georgia. There is great opportunity there.”

All his older siblings, influenced by their father, David, who worked at a hospital at nearby Tuskegee University, had all found a way to enroll in college. Robert was determined to make sure the family streak remained intact. He passed on the importance of competition and education to his sons Joshua (minister), Caleb (manager of the Georgia Theatre) and Nathan (lawyer).

Today, his voice remains active with the Georgia athletes who are within reach of a degree. He reminds them of the value a degree will make in their lives and their future. He provides counseling and advice to Georgia athletes, an invaluable member of the athletic staff who is caring, selfless and always lending a helping hand.

You should take a look at the University of Georgia. There is great opportunity there.



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Loran Smith: Remembering the Life and Legacy of Georgia Football's 'The General'

On a muggy night (Sept. 19, 1964) in Tuscaloosa, Alabama, Joe Namath, in the first series, lined up under center, called for the snap and dropped back to throw. As soon as he set up in the pocket, George Patton was in his face and threw the heralded Tide All-American for a nine-yard loss.

Sitting in the press box beside the irrepressible Dan Magill, I had trouble restraining myself in that no-cheering environment. Patton, who was the cornerstone of the Vince Dooley era, returned to his home state (he grew up in Tusculum, 119 miles north of the Alabama campus) confident that the Bulldogs would win the game.

Unfortunately, Patton's sack of Namath was the highlight of the evening for UGA partisans as the home team won 31-3 and went on to win the national championship.

The fact that Patton believed the Bulldogs could win the game was a reflection of his competitive confidence. He never failed to believe his team could win. He never embraced or accepted losing. More often than not, he was right and when big things happened on the field during his era, he either made it happen or was the catalyst that brought it about.

Patton came to Athens as the third brother in his family to play Southeastern Conference football—Houston had played for Ole Miss and James played at Alabama. The youngest Patton was a strong-armed quarterback, but otherwise, had little distinction. George, however, was quick and agile which would prove to be his ticket to starting status and becoming a two time All-American.

George arrived in Athens in 1963 when Johnny Griffith was in his last year as the Bulldogs' coach, and No. 76 was ineligible to play as a freshman. When the Dooley staff came to town, some of the seasoned players were capable and competent. They appreciated the core fundamentals of the game—they were adept at blocking and tackling.

The new staff had something to work with.

Dooley's youthful brain trust placed a premium on finding players who had the consummate desire and passion to play. Initially, they did not know where to put the sanguine Alabamian. Fortunately, by that time, he had caught the eye of the canny defensive coordinator Erskine Russell who coveted George's speed and quickness—and on the field smarts, a perceptive competitor who often knew what the opposing quarterback was thinking.

When the head coach reviewed the defensive tackle idea with Patton, he grinned and said, "Coach I don't care where I line up, I just want to play."



That was the essence of George Patton, nicknamed "The General," for old "Blood and Guts" of World War II fame. UGA's Patton loved the game of football and never played a down in which he did not give his best, becoming the master of "big plays" for his entire career, none more impactful than against Alabama in 1965 between the hedges.

In the second quarter, the opposite tackle, Jiggy Smaha, crashed into Bama quarterback Steve Sloan, which brought about a fluttering pass, which Patton picked off, and raced 55 yards for a touchdown that gave Georgia a 10-0 lead. Alabama would rally and gain the lead, which led to the famous flea-flicker touchdown, which was followed by a two-point conversion, giving the Bulldogs one of the most memorable victories in school history.

What set Patton apart, however, was his remarkable leadership. He always underscored team first principles. He might arrange a beer celebration for his teammates after a big victory, but he would never let the party get out of hand. He would never let a teammate drink and drive. He deflected praise and preached "team" mantras throughout his career. "George was always lining us up in the right position," said Bill Stanfill, the great All-American and later Super Bowl star with the Miami Dolphins. "He was our coach on the field."

There has never been a coach-player mutual admiration society like George and his mentor, Erk Russell. They were perfect for each other. Erk the ultimate proponent of where there is a will, there is a way and George the driven and eager performer whose lion heart led him and his team to greatness.

That relentless heart finally stopped last week, when he died of throat cancer as he was trying to summon the strength to follow his beloved team through another season.

The Georgia chapter of the National Football Foundation and the Athletic Association have nominated George for induction into the College Football Hall of Fame. As a two time All-American, who moved from quarterback to tackle, along with being an accomplished student in the classroom is evidence that he should receive this high honor. "All I want is to be nominated," George said—forever the modest proponent.



Tommy Lawhorne

SEA ISLAND – Life has thrown Tommy Lawhorne, the A+ linebacker, a curve ball, but the valedictorian of his class, Academic all-America surgeon, and goodwill ambassador extraordinaire has taken a stiff-upper-lip approach to managing his illness—just as his friends would have predicted for the handsome native of Sylvester.

Those who become informed about his circumstance first need to understand that it is not football related. He does *not* have Alzheimer's, and he can lead a productive and fulfilling life following the dictates of an inquiring mind.

He has been diagnosed with cognitive impairment and is focusing on a healthy diet, engaging in daily exercise, and playing brain games on the computer. He appreciates the importance of staying socially active, which is not a challenge in that he has friends across the state. "I sleep well, and although I am not as quick mentally as I used to be, I am confident I will be okay," he said recently, following lunch with friends.

"Many of us have what Tommy has," says his friend and fellow physician Mixon Robinson, longtime UGA team orthopedist. "It just varies with the individual."

Lawhorne's charming wife, Susan, who has always been his confidante and devoted companion, is the ultimate familial caregiver and continues to be his intellectual partner as well as dietitian and driver. They continue to travel and seek an inquisitive and probing lifestyle, which has always characterized their abundant lives.

How they met and became a lifelong couple is an interesting story. When UGA teammate Mark Holmes told his girlfriend that he had a friend who went to the library every night without fail, she smiled and said, "I have a friend who does that, too." That turned out to be Susan. "We should get them introduced," Mark said. They did. You know the rest of the story.

Studying together made them want to spend their lives together. It has been a staple of their marriage that they are constantly reading magazines and books.

Following retirement from his medical practice, the Lawhornes moved to Sea Island, which connected them geographically with their son, Tom III, also a doctor, and his family, who live a few streets away. Their daughter, Gervaise Gerstner, a highly regarded dermatologist in Manhattan, visits as often as possible. The Lawhornes, like most their age, are preoccupied with the activities of grandchildren.

Tommy gets the ultimate praise from the football players of his time, all who give him the highest compliment as being a good teammate. He always had a bent for humor, keen on wisecracking with them and springing practical jokes on them.

His roommate was Ronnie Jenkins, "Wild Bull of the Flatlands." They were the odd couple—Tommy the engaging intellectual and Ronnie the aw-shucks country boy who entertained people with his toothless grin and downhome vernacular.

When the Athens Touchdown Club honored Jenkins last fall with one of its flashback tributes, Tommy made the trip to Athens to join in the celebration of Ronnie's great game against Florida in 1966, the game which prevented Steve Spurrier from winning the SEC championship as a player.

Over the years when a fellow player was suffering, Tommy reached out to teammates to them know their friend was in distress. He counseled with family and friends. He attended funerals and wakes.

His friendship with Paul Handmacher was one of great poignancy. A South Georgia Southern Baptist and a Northside Atlanta Jewish kid were brought together by playing college football.

At the height of their professional years, Handmacher was given to calling his former teammate and driving 81 miles from Montgomery, Ala., to Columbus for lunch. Those were warm and emotionally fulfilling sessions when they recalled the high times of a successful college football program—and the gratifying benefits of a warm and enduring friendship.

They didn't discuss religion, politics, the environment, the Middle East, or the national debt. They expressed their appreciation for having won an SEC championship in 1966, reminiscing about the plays and circumstances that brought the title about. There was talk about family and teammates, their love for alma mater and their pride in the University of Georgia's growing reputation as an institution of higher learning.

When Tommy and Susan settled in at the Georgia coast, he discovered that state residents could enroll in classes at state supported institutions and audit courses. That was like Br'er Rabbit being thrown into the briar patch.

He continues that routine with the greatest of personal appreciation. Like a chocolate sundae with a cherry on top, growing up in Sylvester in the fifties—he just can't get enough.

Proud of his small-town raising, he has often harked back to those days of his youth—he read constantly and did the things many Worth County boys did growing up. He went to Boy



Scout camps, he hunted quail, he had a paper route. He played the piano. He even picked cotton. The first major book he read was the Bible.

When he was selected as a delegate to Boys Nation in 1963, he met President John Fitzgerald Kennedy in Washington. He wrote the President a letter. Kenndy wrote him back.

My guess is that none of his classmates at Johns Hopkins had those experiences and, in all probability, never even read about such. This well roundedness has been an ally throughout his life—he has an undying love for his state and his alma mater.

He speaks endearingly of the teachers along the way, including his chemistry teacher in Sylvester. “He was so good,” Tommy says. “He made chemistry a breeze in Athens.” He had the same regard for his UGA professors when he got to Johns Hopkins. “I was well prepared,” he says.

Tommy Lawhorne is an intellectual who has always had the common touch. He has never had an issue or a challenge he could not manage, which should bode well for him with his latest challenge. History is on his side.


