Tommy Lawhorne Was an Athlete Who Excelled on the Field and in the Classroom at UGA

SEA ISLAND — The Golden Isles have never been more golden than today with more and more people wanting to settle down into easy and laid-back living after years of keeping their nose to the grindstone in their chosen profession. The quality of life here is touted as being as good as you could want.

There is something for everyone from all walks of life — from shell searching, to fishing and hunting and especially golf. There's tennis, bird watching and photo-ops galore. Come here for a week, a month or for life and you can play golf to your heart's content — on courses that not only challenge the everyday player, but the best in the world.

Professionals like Davis Love, Harris English, Brian Harmon, Zach Johnson and Matt Kuchar among others have identified with the good living amenities of this area and have chosen to make their homes here. With Jacksonville's international airport only an hour away, these worldwide travelers, along with many well-to-do residents, can embark to any port in the world with uncomplicated connections.

The appealing environment of the Golden Isles makes passionate drumbeaters out of the locals who want prosperity to continue to flourish, angling for a repetitive and sustained cycle.

There is much ado about those with Bulldog allegiance who work, play and retire here. Like Tommy Lawhorne, for example. He arrived in Athens the same time as Vince Dooley with whom he developed a gentlemanly rapport and mutual admiration society while establishing himself as a competent linebacker with extraordinary intellect and a well-roundedness for the ages.

His credentials were essentially that he was an A+ student who also happened to play football. He had ingrained passion for the game, dating back to his grade-school days in Worth Country — but would have been offended at the notion that he would ever become one dimensional.

Lawhorne was atypical to most college athletes of his era and with many who cast their lot with the Bulldogs. He considered football an upstanding game, but he signed a grant-in-aid as a means to earn a degree with someone else picking up the tab—as great of a tradeoff as there has ever been in our society.

He was a small-town boy who was raised where cotton, peanuts and corn were agricultural staples, along with pine trees and the bobwhite quail — a country boy who was blessed with an extraordinary drive and intellect which would bode well for his future. The Ivy League was well within his reach, but he aspired to play football and matriculate at his state university. After all, the brand of football was the best in the land, and he held UGA in high academic esteem. Later, when he hung out his shingle, he was, in part, a Georgia boy with a Georgia education and proud of it.

Lawhorne played on an SEC championship team, earned three letters in football and experienced national network television looking over his shoulder as he wore the red and back. That satiated his football objectives, but he would have appreciated it if the announcers had told the world that he arrived in Athens with his first priority being to earn a degree. Philosophically, today, he laments that there are all too many college football players giving the earning of a diploma the back of their hand. He bonded with his teammates, some with goals and ambitions, some not. He helped them with their homework. He offered sage advice and inspired them to take advantage of opportunity. He developed a special relationship with a Jewish teammate and befriended his family. When maladies and downturns came about when they became middle aged — cancer, heart disease and the like, he was a source of counsel and hope to their families.

His onetime roommate was Ronnie Jenkins, a woodsman who struggled with fulfilling degree requirements, but persevered and reached his objective. Nobody was prouder than Tommy Lawhorne, who has been known to take time off from work to reach out and visit with his former teammates and offer help and medical advice. Sometimes, unfortunately, it has been condolences. Altruism has always been a staple of his medical satchel.

When he completed degree requirements at Johns Hopkins — where he took pleasure in knowing that he was as equipped to excel in the advanced curriculum as the private school aficionados who were given to snobbery with respect to their academic background — he settled down in Columbus to practice medicine.

He and his sagacious wife, Susan, a native of Atlanta, raised their children, Tom and Gervaise, who followed in their sire's medical footsteps. Tom is a local orthopedic and Gervaise a dermatologist living in New York City.

By the time he retired from medical practice in 2020, Tommy and Susan had chosen a high-rise residence in downtown Columbus, overlooking the Chattahoochee — picturesque, becoming and gripping, but the allure of grandchildren made them uproot and make the cross-state move to the Golden Isles. As soon as he settled in, Lawhorne, after a cursory inquiry, discovered that there is an amendment on the books that allows any Georgia resident 65 years of age or older to audit any course taught in the university system for free. So long as there is space for the regular students.

It was like throwing a rabbit in a briar patch. There is no place like home for Thomas W. Lawhorne than a classroom. His intellectual capacity and motivation are a reminder that a person never grows too old to accumulate knowledge and that there is no limit to learning if you have an inquiring mind. This old Dawg is a good and great American.

Georgia Chapter of National Football Foundation Honorees Include Verne Lundquist

The Georgia Chapter of the National Football Foundation, the nation's largest chapter for many years, staged its annual awards banquet earlier this week at the Athens Country Club with Lenn Chandler, chapter President, getting the program underway.

There was emphasis reserved for scholar-athletes as the chapter also recognized a number of luminaries, highlighted by honoring Verne Lundquist, longtime CBS broadcaster, and Steve Hatchell, President and CEO of the National Football Foundation.

With the popular Lundquist, fresh from calling the action at the 16th hole at the Masters, spending the weekend in Athens (he was also recognized by the UGA Athletic Association at the halftime of the G-Day game on Saturday), there was considerable socializing which allowed for back porch conversation with two seasoned raconteurs — Lundquist and Hatchell.

Lundquist, along with Michael Burnett, CEO of the Piedmont Athens Regional Medical Center, were honored with the chapter's Distinguished American Awards. Hatchell was recognized for his Contribution to Amateur Football Award.

One of the most admired young men on the Athletic Association premises, Mark Christensen, a member of Ron Courson's sports medicine staff, was also recognized for his "contributions to amateur football."

It was a high moment as Christensen was the recipient of a standing ovation following Courson's introduction.

The banquet began with a video produced by the NFF on the values of the game of football.

The video was followed by a live auction, ably stewarded by Louis Tonsmeire of Cartersville, which got the event moving forward in a festive mood.

A near full house of honorees, sponsors and loyal supporters at the Athens Country Club was a reminder that the Georgia chapter of the NFF, has come a long way since its inception in 1986. This was the 36th annual dinner and was one of the best attended.

The event attracted UGA Athletic Director, Josh Brooks and former AD, Vince Dooley who was on hand to recognize the Frances Wood Wilson Foundation scholar athletes.

John Parker, one of the Super Gold Sponsors, presented the J. Reid Parker Post Graduate awards to six former Bulldog athletes, recognized for post graduate achievement, an impressive group including Howard Hudson of Augusta, Knox Culpepper of Atlanta, Robert Edwards, Sandersville, Larry Brown, Oglethorpe County and Virgil Cole, Madison.

Jesse Hickey of the Turner Family Foundation, presented the Jack Turner Award which honors the UGA outstanding senior football player at UGA who is defined by his exceptional accomplishments and varied interests — a well-rounded Georgia man; Stetson Bennett, given an extra year of eligibility owing to COVID, was the winner of the Jack Turner Award this year.

Jeff Petrea of Georgia Power, recognized the two local public high schools Cedar Shoals (Dreco Thomas, athletic director) and Clarke Central (Jon Ward, athletic director) for their Play it Smart honorees, Juan'Darion Silas and Will Richardson for their fine record as student athletes. Each player receives a scholarship grant provided by Barb and Carl Parks.

Fred Butler of Coca-Cola presented the Coca-Cola Helping Hand award to Madison Sanders, executive director, of Family Promise of Athens and Robert Miles, of the UGA Football Administrated Staff, presented the Billy Payne Award to John Fitzpatrick.

Matt Brinkley of CPC advisors, presented Steve Hatchell, with the Chapter's Contribution to Amateur Football. Hatchell complimented the chapter on its growth and development and pointed out how the game of football had provided outstanding leaders who benefitted from leadership skills they learned from college football, the greatest of games.




As Vince Dooley Approaches 90, He's Still Learning History, Gardening, Football and Life

You may be familiar with Great Southern Wood Preserving, the lumber processor in Abbeville, Alabama. The producers of a popular building product, "Yellawood," Great Southern is owned by Jimmy Rane, a college football aficionado who arranged for his company to sponsor football coaches shows for many years.

He holds an annual golf outing and banquet for coaches and athletes each spring. The late <u>Pat Dye</u> of Auburn and Alabama's <u>Gene Stallings</u> became members of his corporate board. Rane has a Foundation whose purpose is to provide scholarships to kids across 28 states. Its corpus now exceeds \$6 million.



A few years later, he came with a similar evening of recognition for his friend and ally, Pat Dye, who passed away in June 2020. Last week, Great Southern honored Vince Dooley.

The Great Southern tribute brought about reflections from one speaker who finds the former Bulldog coaching icon to be more than a football coach. He is a historian, author, master gardener, fisherman, researcher and lecturer. Being a historian, he allowed recently how cheerleading began.

If you are up on your history, you are aware that when Lady Godiva made her protest against what she considered an unfair tax in the eleventh century, she rode her horse nude through the streets of Coventry, England.

Vince, known for his passion for research, following an exhaustive search, discovered that she happened to have ridden her horse side-saddle. This caused the people of the side of the street who faced her to begin yelling, "Hooray for our side."

Vincent Joseph Dooley grew up on the waterfront in Mobile, a depression-born kid of Irish and Italian descent. He learned how to fend for himself as a kid and took to sports naturally.



He was particularly good at basketball and football. He had the good fortune to have gotten direction in his life from the sisters and brothers at the McGill Institute in Mobile, teachers who gave of themselves for the kids who came their way.

Vince went to Auburn on scholarship to play both basketball and football, but he preferred basketball in his early years. It was his best friend Bobby Duke who refused to let Vince sleep in on the first day of August football practice his junior year in high school. Duke rousted him out of bed and thereby "saved" Vince's football career

Vince was a good student because he enjoyed learning and was particularly attracted to history. That is why it was nothing of a surprise when, with enterprise and due diligence, he earned a Masters Degree in history at Auburn while a member of Coach Shug Jordan's coaching staff.

When Joel Eaves hired him in Athens, once Vince got settled, he went over to the Main Library to become familiar with its surroundings. It bowled over the gentleman director of the Library, Porter Kellam, who was flabbergasted that the head football coach had come the library's way.

I wrote a story about the commotion Vince had caused on North Campus among the learned professors and administrators. It was picked up by the Associated Press and distributed on their Southeastern wire.

Frank Howard, the colorful Clemson coach later told me to give Vince a message. "Tell Doooley," Coach Howard drawled, "that the library will be a nice cool place for him to hide when the alumni get after his... 'anatomy.""

When Vince arrived in Athens, things were not good. Georgia had fallen on hard times. Facilities had become nondescript, there was no money in the bank, losing big games became the norm. There had been one bowl invitation in 14 seasons. There was disharmony among the alumni and doom saying was an everyday topic around town.

Vince and Joel Eaves, who hired him, kept to themselves, rolled up their sleeves and went to work. Applying energy, good sense

and the underscoring of the work ethic and fundamentals, they reversed the trend in Athens.

Vince was as fundamentally sound as any coach in America. Right away, he and his coaching staff played an exciting brand of football, underscoring defense, running the football and emphasizing the kicking game.

Within five years there were four bowl invitations and two SEC titles. Season ticket sales zoomed upwards with alacrity. After three seasons of Dooley ball, the stadium was decked. Sanford stadium was the place to be on Saturday afternoons in the fall.

Vince elevated Georgia football to a new level, winning games, competing for championships and seeing the Bulldogs enjoy national rankings. He restored the prestige of Georgia football.

After a quarter century, Vince had won 200 games, 6 SEC titles and the 1980 national championship. He won practically every

coaching award that existed. A great portion of that time, he also served as Georgia's athletic director, upgrading facilities across the board and developing a strong overall athletic program that ranked Georgia among the best in the country.

This parting shot. Vince is the only football coach in history to be invited to speak at both touchdown clubs and garden clubs. If he were coaching today, he wouldn't have time to garden and spend time at the library, which is a little sad. But Barbara would be excited to make the monthly deposits from the salaries they pay coaches today.

Vince, a nonagenarian to be, in recent years kept a quote at his desk at home from the great Michelangelo, who said on his 87th birthday, "I'm still learning." When Vince becomes a nonagenarian in September, he can quote the famous Renaissance artist/sculptor. He will still be learning.









